When to use HAVE HAD & HAD HAD In the present perfect, the auxiliary verb is always have (for I, you, we, they) or has (for he, she, it) In the past perfect, the auxiliary verb is always had We use have had in the present perfect when the main verb is also "have": I'm not feeling well I have had a headache all day
